Jamar Montgomery scores one of his two TD's

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The Centerville Elks had multiple opportunities to seize the momentum and put Springboro away last Friday night. Unfortunately, a few self-inflicted wounds led to a late 4th quarter upset of the Elks 17-21. Our special teams, stellar all season, had a turnover with 83 seconds left, that gave the Panthers a first and ten on the Elks 11 yard line. It took Springboro five plays to go the final distance for the game winner, and hand the Elks their first loss of the year.

The Elks had dominated the first half, taking a fourteen point lead into the locker room. The coaching staff reminded the Elks that Springboro was down 0-13 the week before at Fairmont and came back to win by two. Turnovers and penalties were detrimental. Centerville was averaging fifty-five yards on six penalties for the first five games. Against Springboro, the Elks had **15** penalties for **127** yards! We cannot be in a position to win the game in the fourth quarter, and give it away.

Sophomore WR Jamar Montgomery #24 (above) had a breakout game with 103 passing yards, and two touchdown receptions. The Elks offense put up 270 total yards, and the defense gave up 281 yards, mostly in the fourth quarter. Nic Bruder continued his remarkable success returning kickoffs and punts. He had six returns for 117 yards, and had another interception return on defense as well.

Reggie Powers and Seth Alejandrino led the Black Shirt defense with nine tackles each. Ross Coppock and Nic Bruder both had interceptions that ended Panther drives. It is exciting to watch this defense play, their gang tackling and pursuit to the ball makes Elk defense Ancestors proud!

A new era starts tonight with Marcus Colvin, from Chaminade-Julienne, debuting against the Elks as Beavercreek's new head coach. The Beavers are 2-4 this season, which are the Beavers first two wins in the last three years.

This marks the 50th meeting since 1973. The Elks and Beavers have played 49 games with Centerville winning 47 times. The Elks have averaged 33 points to the Beavers 10, including 16 shutouts, and scoring over 40 points 14 times.

Let's **Go Elks**, bounce back, continue the tradition tonight, and get number 48!

What were the key turning point in last week's week Springboro game?

There were multiple turning points in the game where we didn't perform as we should have. First, we start the game by taking the ball down into their redzone, but throw an interception. Those were points that we should've had to help our defense out. Next, we drove into their redzone again later in the game and only came up with 3 points. Another turning point was when we were on the 1-yardline and scored, but it ended up not counting because of a penalty. After a sack and another fumble, we came away with zero points on that drive as well. Compound those mistakes with multiple personal fouls, and we had a lot of points where we could've won the game and did not. Springboro played very well and you can't afford to have those mistakes against a team like that.

What do you expect from your leaders and captains following last week's game?

We expect them to respond. We have been stressing the ability to be held accountable. No one is a victim. We are all responsible. We all need to be better and when someone is trying to help us be better, we need to accept it and make a change. Someone holding you accountable is a form of love. No one is a victim. We must be compelled to improve. We are always becoming and we must learn that we have never arrived. It starts at the top with me, the coaches, and our captains. We all have to take ownership, improve, and be able to be held accountable.

What experience as a player and coach has helped you bounce back following a loss? How tough is it to convert frustration into motivation?

We have faced tough losses in the past. One that I recall was in 2017 at Northmont. We lost a very close game to a really good team. The team came back the following week with vigor, practiced hard, and was able to close out the season with some really great team wins. That's exactly what we need to do now. You're right, there is a lot of frustration from last week. It's hard to get over. But the only way to get over it is to get back to work and continue to improve. I'm not really a big fan of "motivation." I believe that motivation comes and goes. It's not sustainable. I'm more a fan of humility. It needs to be at our core. We must be compelled to improve, always, in everything we do. If it's not at our core, we will improve, maybe achieve what we want, and fall off again in the future. Stay the course and continue to improve. That's what we have to do.

Beavercreek has hired a very successful coach (Marcus Colvin), will this be a different offense and/or defense?

Coach Colvin is a good friend. I got to know him very well over the years and he is someone that I look up to. He did a great job at Chaminade and there's no doubt in my mind that he will do a good job at Beavercreek. Coach Colvin also hired one of our former coaches, Corey Freed. Both are great coaches and even better people. They will get those kids playing hard and they have great football knowledge that will give them confidence in their gameplan. Beavercreek is playing much better football and they have those guys playing hard. It's great to see them improve and we are excited for the opportunity to play them.

Who are some of Beavercreek's key players?

We are very impressed by their running back. He does an awesome job hitting holes and he's a great athlete. He's also very active in special teams so he will be all over the field making plays. They also have a really nice linebacker, #25, that plays hard and makes a ton of plays. The offense is systematic and they find holes and the defense will make it hard to score.

Springboro stuns No. 2 Elks with TD in final seconds

SPRINGBORO — The public address announcer at CareFlight Field summed it up best.

"What a turn of events," he said.

Springboro rallied from a 17-7 deficit in the fourth quarter Friday, beating Centerville 21-17 on a 1-yard touchdown run by quarterback Evan Ruzzo with 14 seconds remaining.

"I just said, 'This is right here; give it all you've got,'" said Ruzzo, a senior who threw 12 touchdown passes and ran for three scores in the first five games. "The O-line got push. I had a lead blocker in front of me. I just leaped over the line."

The Elks, ranked second in the Division I state poll, suffered their first loss and fell to 5-1 and 2-1 in the Greater Western Ohio Conference. With No. 5 Springfield also losing Friday, 24-21 at home to Fairmont, Springboro (5-1, 3-0) finds itself alone atop the league with four games to play.

"It means everything," Ruzzo said. "Our defense stepped up big time. Offensively, we didn't play a great (first) half. But this team shows so much heart, and they just don't ever give up."

Springboro celebrated first with its band and then with

its student section, which flooded the field. Then in the locker room, player after player and coach after coach took turns dancing in the middle of a crowd of players. At one point, coach Ryan Wilhite was lifted into the air by the players.

This was that type of emotional victory. Springboro ended a two-game losing streak in the series.

"Nothing was easy tonight," Wilhite said.

"Defensively, (Centerville) is so good, and they cause you to do things you don't really want to do and get out of your game plan. It seems like you're always off schedule on your play calls. But we had some big plays. Some guys stepped up and made some huge plays. Evan Ruzzo, I mean, he got beat tonight a little bit, but he just kept coming back for more. Defensively, I thought we got a lot of stops in the sec-

ond half, which we really needed."

Springboro's comeback started with a touchdown run by Willizaun Yates with 2:38 left in the fourth. That cut Centerville's lead to 17-14.

After a failed onside kick, Springboro forced Centerville into a 4th-and-2 with 1:27 left. The Elks punted, but the snap was fumbled, and then the punt was blocked. Springboro returned the ball to the Centerville 11-yard line

with 1:12 to play.

"We didn't have any timeouts, so we knew a punt block gave us the best chance on the short field," Wilhite said. "So we kind of sold out for that one."

Ruzzo saw the punt block and said, "This is our opportunity. Let's take advantage of it."

Centerville had control for most of the night, taking a 14-0 halftime lead on two touchdown passes by

Drake Wells to Jamar Montgomery.

Wells first connected with Montgomery for a 12-yard touchdown with 2:08 left in the first quarter.

Then one play after an interception by Springboro's Zach Wells, Nic Bruder picked off a pass for Centerville. The Elks capitalized on a 6-yard touchdown pass from Wells to Montgomery.

Wells has eight touchdown passes. These were the first touchdown catches of the season for Montgomery.

Centerville appeared to take a 21-0 lead late in the third quarter, but a 1-yard TD run was wiped away by a penalty. Springboro capitalized on its next possession as Ruzzo ran for a score to trim the Elks' lead to 14-7 with 1:35 left in third.

Jackson Courville kicked a 27-yard field goal to give Centerville a 17-7 lead with 6:44 left in fourth.

The rest of the way, Springboro showed the same fight that helped it beat Fairmont 21-19 the previous week. It rallied from a 13-0 halftime deficit in that game.

"We have a lot of heart, and I love each and every one of these guys," Ruzzo said.

Troy 25, Sidney 7: Willie Ritchie and Cameron Stoltz had rushing TDs and Marcus Cavanaugh returned an interception 50 yards for a TD to lead the Trojans (4-2, 3-2 MVL).

Piqua 63, Fairborn 0: Brady Ouhl tossed three TD passes to Dre'Sean Roberts and Ky Warner rushed for

204 yards and a score for the Indians (5-1, 4-1 MVL).

Ouhl added a rushing TD, as did Andrew Miller and Sam Schmiesing.

Fenwick 24, Chaminade-Julienne 7: The Falcons opened Greater Catholic League Co-ed play with a win to move to 5-1, 1-0.

Alter 28, Cin. McNicholas 7: The Knights moved

to 4-2, 1-0 with a road win in the GCL Co-ed opener.

Valley View 28, Brookville 14: Austin Stidham returned an interception for a touchdown and had a 74-yard punt return for a score as the Spartans won the SWBL West showdown.

Jacob Clark rushed for 117 yards and a TD and Caden

Henson tossed a TD pass for Valley View, which won its fourth straight to move to 5-1, 3-0 SWBL West.

The Blue Devils fell to 5-1, 2-1.

Greenville 34, West Carrollton 8: The Green Wave (1-5, 1-4 MVL) won their first game with a road win against the Pirates (0-6, 0-5).

Colvin, players take on challenge of building winner at Beavercreek

Spencer Johnson was in the Beavercreek weight room at 7 a.m. in January when his new head football coach, Marcus Colvin, came to meet some of his players. Colvin couldn't stay long. He had to get to his job by 7:30 as assistant principal at Chamaine-Julienne.

"It was really impressive to me," Johnson said.

First impressions between Colvin, who left CJ after 11 seasons, and the Beaver-creek players, who didn't win a game last year, have been good.

"I love him," Johnson said. "He brings so much energy, brings a whole different vibe. It's awesome."

Junior linebacker C.J. Crawford feels the same way. "I love him," he said. "He's loving all of us kids and just bringing great energy to this program. Definitely a new step for us."

Unexpected chance

Colvin was set at CJ with a strong program. He started there when he was 22 after playing football at Dayton.

"I always want to make sure I communicate that CJ did nothing wrong," Colvin said. "In fact, it says a lot about Beavercreek that they could entice me to consider and then close me out on leaving such a great place. What CJ did for me in terms of my personal growth and my opportunities and coaching, I will never be able to repay that."

At 41, Colvin felt ready for a new challenge, and Beaver-creek offered a package he couldn't pass up. In addition to coaching, he will supervise a new alternative education program.

"I get to work with some students who are really struggling and that's right up my alley," he said. "I really enjoy

being in front of young people and just finding a way to get them to understand how great they can be."

The challenge

Colvin says he and his staff, which includes six who came with him from CJ and three holdovers, won't lie to the players. They have confronted the recent past of 11 straight losses and a 5-36 record over the past four years.

The Beavers last winning season was 2017 and they last shared a GWOC title in 2012. They have never qualified for the playoffs.

"People are like, there's no way that Beaver-creek will ever win," Colvin said. "And I understand that because that's what history tells you. But I'm a pretty proud person, I love to surround myself with good people and I just believe there's a lot of infrastructure here. If we put our time and energy into what I think we can do, I feel like we're going to be able to do it."

Colvin said his team has some talent. Right now, it's just that teams like Springfield and Wayne have more. One of those players is Crawford, who is ready to lead a turnaround and not relive last year's blowouts and second-half running clocks.

"It was very difficult, especially just walking through the hallways at school, everyone clowning you because you play football," he said. "And it shouldn't ever be that way."

Colvin, Crawford and Johnson believe the Beavers will win some games this season. But perhaps the most important goal is to change the attitude. The first good sign of change is that more players than last year have been at summer workouts and are expected to be on the practice field Monday for the first official day of practice.

Colvin and his staff are challenging the players to respond well to adversity. When he watches game film from last year he sees a team that didn't respond well.

"I tell them every day, 'You guys are winners,'" Colvin said. "They need to hear that. When you're getting beat up on continuously, it's easy to believe you're not good enough. And that's something we've really tried to work on through our summer, our team camps and our conversations with our team."

Other new coaches

Jim Dimitroff, Catholic Central: In his fifth decade of coaching, Dimitroff, 65, takes over at his alma mater after serving as offensive coordinator during last year's 7-4 season.

Brian Bogenschutz, Cedarville: After nine years as an assistant at his alma mater Xenia, Bogenschutz takes over a program that was 2-8 last season.

Earl White, CJ: As head coach at Belmont and Thurgood Marshall, White compiled a record of 124-76 with eight playoff appearances.

Larry Cox, Fairborn: The Skyhawks hired a proven winner in Cox, who began his 26-season career as head coach for two years at Bellbrook. After 21 years, over 100 victories and five playoff appearances at Lakota West, Cox resigned in 2018. He followed that with a 10-8 record and a home playoff win in two seasons at Oxford Talandia. Last year he coached Franklin to a 4-6 record.

Luke Hurst, Franklin: Hurst gets his first opportunity as head coach. He has been offensive coordinator at Northmont under Tony Broering.

Micah Faler, Lebanon: Faler served as Lebanon's quarterback coach and passing game coordinator since 2019.

Derrick Shepard, Meadowdale: Shepard returns to his alma mater. He had a successful career at Georgia Tech and played several seasons of arena football.

Troy Everhart, Troy: Everhart's resume includes a 2009 state championship at Cincinnati Winton Woods where he went 80-41 in 11 seasons. He has also been head coach at Middletown.

Matt King, Valley View: King is the Spartans' third head coach in three years. He has been on the staff seven years.

Chris Mobley, West Carrollton: Mobley will try to turn the Pirates into a winner like he did in six seasons at Cincinnati Hughes. He was 26-28 there, including 17-8 the past three seasons with two playoff appearances.







The NFHS writes playing rules for high school sports and provides guidance on a multitude of national issues. They offer online education courses for high school coaches, officials, students, parents, and music leaders through the NFHS Learning Center. Ultimately, their goal is to ensure that all students have an opportunity to enjoy healthy participation, achievement and good sportsmanship in education-based activities.

2022 FOOTBALL POINTS OF EMPHASIS

SPORTSMANSHIP

Good sporting behavior is one of the fundamental ingredients to the continued success and enjoyment of education-based high school sports and activities. In fact, in the 103-year history of organized high school sports in the United States, good sportsmanship has been one of the most important outcomes of high school activity programs.

NFHS playing rules are written to encourage sportsmanship. Participation in these programs should promote respect, integrity and sportsmanship. However, for these ideals to occur, everyone involved in these programs must be doing their part.

The NFHS is concerned that unsporting behavior in education-based athletics has increased across all sports. As a result, the NFHS has made sportsmanship the No. 1 Point of Emphasis for the 2022-23 school year.

Sportsmanship, or good sporting behavior, is about treating one another with respect and exhibiting appropriate behavior. It is about being fair, honest and caring. When these types of appropriate behavior occur, competitive play is more enjoyable for everyone.

Coaches set the tone during football games with their display of sportsmanship. If these individuals act in a sportsmanlike manner, their behavior sets the tone for players, spectators and others. If coaches, however, are complaining constantly about the decision of game officials, spectators are more likely to do the same.

There must be a collaborative, working relationship between game officials and game administration to promote good sportsmanship and safely conduct the game. Everyone has their roles to play in creating a positive, sportsmanlike atmosphere at games.

Game officials should focus on the actions of players, coaches and other sideline personnel. A positive, open line of communication between game officials and coaches ultimately results in a better game for everyone involved.

Game officials, however, should never engage with spectators who are exhibiting unsporting behavior. Once the game begins, school administration is responsible for dealing with unruly spectators. A proactive approach by school administration includes monitoring the behavior of spectators and intervening as needed.

If spectators are using demeaning or profane language at game officials – or at others in the stands – those individuals should be removed from the game by school administration.

In recent years, a heightened level of unsportsmanlike behavior has been occurring by spectators at high school football games, and it must be stopped. The use of demeaning language, or hate speech, by students, parents and other fans must cease.

TARGETING / DEFENSELESS PLAYER

The NFHS Football Rules Committee feels coaches, game officials and players have all worked together to recognize and remove most targeting fouls from the game, but considerable work still needs to be done understanding/penalizing illegal defenseless player contact. As stakeholders in the game, removing needless contact from football should be prioritized by coaches, game officials and players.

Targeting is an act by any player who takes aim and initiates contact against an opponent above the shoulders with the helmet, forearm, hand, fist, elbow or shoulders.

To ensure the long-term success of high school football, risk minimization must remain a priority for all stakeholders of the game. Coaches, game officials and players must understand the importance of removing unnecessary contact from the game. A concerted effort must be made by all to eliminate targeting and illegal defenseless player contact from football.

LEGAL UNIFORMS AND EQUIPMENT

The purpose of the NFHS Football Equipment Rules is to ensure the safety and protection of both the player wearing the equipment and their opponent. Due to the potential for injury, it is essential that game officials strictly enforce equipment rules and that coaches support that enforcement.

The head coach is primarily responsible for the legality of a team's equipment. Prior to the start of each game, the head coach must verify to the referee and another game official that all players are legally equipped in compliance with the rules and that no illegal equipment will be used. Most equipment violations can be prevented by the coaching staff communicating the equipment rules to players prior to the teams arriving at the game.

During pregame duties, game officials should take time to spot-check players for illegal or improperly worn equipment and alert players and coaching staffs of any potential violations. Game officials should not allow any players to participate until all equipment issues have been resolved.

Prior to the ball becoming live, game officials through normal observations should verify that each player is properly and legally equipped. If a player is observed to not meet proper equipment rules, the play clock should be stopped and the equipment violation addressed.

Unless halftime or overtime intermission occurs, any time the play clock is interrupted for improperly worn or missing equipment by a player, the player is to be removed from the game for at least one play. Examples of improperly worn equipment include but are not limited to: Knee pads that do not cover the player's knees; shoulder pads that are not fully covered by the jersey; undershirts not tucked in that extend below the top of the waistline of the pants; and failure to wear a tooth or mouth protector. If any equipment becomes improperly worn during play, correction must be made before continued player participation is allowed. The player would not be required to be removed from the game if the repair can be made promptly and does not delay the ready for play by more than 25 seconds.

Any time a player is found participating with illegal equipment, the player is to be removed from the game and the head coach should be penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct. Examples of illegal equipment include but are not limited to: Eye shade that is not a solid stroke or includes words, numbers, logos or other symbols; eye shields that are not clear (without the presence of any tint); play cards not worn on the wrist or arm; and uniform adornments (exemptions are legal towels and sweatbands properly worn).


